The recruitment for new members is underway and the application process will close on June 12, 2015. As the authority for the citizen members appointed in the 2010-2014 term of Council have been approved to fulfill their duties until the appointment of their successors, there is still a requirement for the two members of Council to be appointed.

If Council requires more time to consider the appointment, the June Audit Committee meeting can proceed as long as quorum requirements of three (3) are met.

Council appointments for the other Committees currently under recruitment will be brought forward to Council with the revised Terms of References at a later date.

A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY AND COLLECTION OF THE SUMS REQUIRED BY THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET FOR 2015 AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE MAILING OF NOTICES REQUISITIONING THE PAYMENT OF TAXES FOR 2015.

WHEREAS Section 312 (2) of the *Municipal Act, as amended,* provides that the Council of a local municipality shall, after the adoption of estimates for the year, pass a by-law to levy a separate tax rate on the assessment in each property class;

AND WHEREAS Sections 307 and 308 of the said Act require tax rates to be established in the same proportion to tax ratios;

AND WHEREAS estimates have been prepared showing the sum of \$151,559,539 is required to be raised for the lawful purposes of the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket for the year 2015, which estimates are made up as follows:

2.	Regional Municipality of York Purposes	\$ 55,169,058

AND WHEREAS any special levy in the Town of Newmarket is based upon the Current Value Assessment as returned on the last revised Assessment Roll as determined by the Ontario Ministry of Finance in accordance with the Ontario Assessment Act as amended, as summarized on Schedule "A" attached to this by-law:

THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket as follows:

 THAT the following property tax class ratios are to be applied in determining tax rates for taxation in 2015:

Residential/Farm Property Class	1.0000
Multi-Residential Property Class	1.0000
Commercial Property Class	1.1172
Industrial Property Class	1.3124
Pipellnes Property Class	0.9190
Farmlands Property Class	0.2500
Managed Forest Property Class	0.2500

2. AND THAT for the year 2015, the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket shall levy upon the Residential Assessment, Multi-residential Assessment, Commercial Assessment, Industrial Assessment, Pipeline Assessment, Farmland Assessment and Managed Forest Assessment the rates of taxation set out in this by-law. The optional property classes allowable which were not adopted by the Region of York have been included within Schedule "A" for clarity, shown with the tax rates established for the default Commercial and Industrial Assessment classes for the respective optional classes;

- 3. AND THAT the sum of \$53,072,903 be levied and collected for the Town of Newmarket's General Purposes as provided by the Corporation's 2015 Operating Budget, such sum to be provided by applying the tax rates as summarized in Schedule "A" attached, to the taxable assessments;
- 4. AND THAT the sum of \$55,169,058 be levied and collected for the Town of Newmarket's share of the 2015 Budget for The Regional Municipality of York, such sum to be provided by applying the tax rates as summarized in Schedule "A" attached, to the taxable assessments;
- 5. AND THAT the sum of \$43,317,578 be levied and collected for the Town of Newmarket's share of the 2015 Ontario Education, such sum to be provided by applying to the taxable assessments the tax rates summarized in Schedule "A" which are the rates prescribed for use by Ontario Regulation 400/98 as amended by O. Reg. 75/15;
- AND THAT for properties so assessed, payments in lieu of taxes shall be calculated using the tax rates in Schedule "A," which would be applicable to the property if it were subject to tax;
- 7. AND THAT for the railway rights-of-way assessments and for the Utility Transmission and Distribution Corridor, assessments shall have their taxes due to the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket calculated in accordance with the Regulations as established by the Minister of Finance and the returned assessment roll;
- 8. AND THAT for the purpose of the business improvement area projects, the sum of \$30,000 shall be levied and collected from the property owners within the business improvement area;
- 9. AND THAT the Treasurer shall add to the Collector's Roll, all or any arrears for cutting weeds or any charges to fence viewers awards or water arrears or any other charges which should be collected pursuant to any statute or by-law to the respective properties chargeable thereto and that the same shall be collected by the Treasurer in the same manner and at the same time as all other rates or levies;
- 10. AND THAT the Interim Tax Levy pursuant to By-law Number 2015-03 shall be shown as a reduction on the final tax levy;
- 11. AND THAT all taxes levied under the authority of this by-law shall become due and payable in three installments; the first installment due July 28, 2015, the second installment due August 25, 2015 and the third installment due September 24, 2015, and all installments shall be payable to the office of the Treasurer of the Town of Newmarket;
 - These due dates are subject to amendment by the Treasurer, if required, to meet the statutory timing required following the tax demand date;
- 12. AND THAT the Treasurer for the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket may mail or cause to be mailed, the notice specifying the amount of taxes payable by any person liable for taxes, addressed to that person's place of residence as indicated on the Collector's Roll;
- 13. AND THAT taxes are payable at the Municipal Offices, 395 Mulock Drive, Newmarket, and at such other places as may be designated by the Town from time to time:

- 14. AND THAT residents who qualify for the Low Income Seniors and Low Income Disabled Tax Deferral Program need to apply to the Tax Office in accordance with the program policies as established by the Regional Municipality of York. The amount of deferral for 2015 will be determined once the application has been approved;
- 15. AND THAT if any section or portion of this by-law or of Schedule "A" is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, it is the intent of Council for the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket that all remaining sections and portions of this by-law continue in force and effect;
- 16. AND THAT Schedule "A" attached hereto shall be and form a part of this by-law.

A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE AN EXEMPTION TO BY-LAW 2004-94, AS AMENDED, BEING A BY-LAW TO PROHIBIT AND REGULATE UNUSUAL NOISES OR NOISES LIKELY TO DISTURB THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET.

WHEREAS Section 129 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, S.O. 2001, c.25, as amended, authorizes a municipality to pass a by-law to prohibit and regulate noise in the municipality;

AND WHEREAS Council enacted By-law 2004-94, being a By-law to Prohibit and Regulate Unusual Noises or Noises Likely to Disturb the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket, on July 19, 2004;

AND WHEREAS Council amended Schedule "A" to By-law 2004-94 with the enactment of By-law 2005-158 on November 28, 2005;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Town of Newmarket deems it advisable to provide an exemption to By-law 2004-94, as amended, to facilitate the necessary work by Compass Construction Resources Ltd. for addition and renovation works to the Newmarket Old Town Hall Cultural Centre, 460 Botsford Street.

THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket as follows:

THAT Compass Construction Resources Ltd., be exempted from the Noise By-law 2004-94, as amended, for a period from June 6, 2015 to September 30, 2015 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. Saturdays only, to perform necessary addition and renovation work to the Newmarket Old Town Hall Cultural Centre, 460 Botsford Street, subject to notification being provided to area residents.

MOTION FOR COUNCIL CONSIDERATION – June 1, 2015

RE: Proposed Amendments to the *Planning Act* and *Development Charges Act* under Bill 73

The Operational Leadership Team recommends:

WHEREAS the Province of Ontario has introduced Bill 73, being proposed amendments to the *Planning Act* and the *Development Charges Act*;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Town of Newmarket on June 1, 2015 adopted the recommendations and endorsed the contents of Joint Development and Infrastructure/Planning & Building Services and Corporate Services/Financial Services Report 2015-13 dated May 4, 2015 which comments on and identifies issues related to the proposed Bill 73;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Town of Newmarket wishes to make further comments with respect to the proposed Bill 73;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket as follows:

- i) **THAT** the Province of Ontario be requested to amend Bill 73 to include the authority for a municipality to establish a sunset clause associated with the approval of privately initiated *Planning Act* applications;
- ii) **AND THAT** the Province of Ontario be requested to amend Bill 73 to restrict appeals of conformity amendments to reflect provincial plans and policy unless the municipal official plan policy provides for more protection or is more restrictive than the provincial plan or policy;
- iii) **AND THAT** the Province of Ontario be requested to amend Bill 73 to extend the review timeframe to 360 days for official plan amendments and plans of subdivision, 240 days for zoning by-law amendment applications, and 60 days for site plan applications, and that these review timeframes be established as-of-right in the *Planning Act*, as opposed to requiring special notice from the applicant or approval authority.
- iv) **AND THAT** this resolution be circulated to Ken Petersen, Manager, Provincial Planning Policy Branch, Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, 777 Bay Street, 13th Floor, Toronto, On, M5G 2E5

Councillor Sponga:

WHEREAS the installation of community mailboxes raises several of the same concerns as the installation of above-ground plant (e.g. utility boxes) in municipally-owned right-of-way; and

WHEREAS the installation of community mailboxes might require installation requests for additional sidewalks where no sidewalks currently exist; and

WHEREAS the installation of community mailboxes might require installation of additional sidewalk approach ramps for easier access, for persons with disabilities or pushing strollers and/or seniors; and

WHEREAS increased snow clearing responsibilities for adjacent property owners and the Town would be needed; and

WHEREAS the installation of additional sign posts, adjacent to community mailboxes for parking regulation changes will be needed; and

WHEREAS the installation of community mailboxes might require additional streetlight requests to improve visibility to and from community mailbox locations and security at these locations.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Council direct the Mayor to send a letter, copied to Members of Parliament, Ontario Members of Provincial Parliament, and all Ontario municipalities, that requests the Federal Minister of Transport, who oversees Canada Post, to require Canada Post to halt installation of community mailboxes immediately and to adhere to its Five-point Action Plan requirement to engage in full and meaningful consultation with all stakeholders, including the Town and its residents;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Council direct staff to bring forward recommendations to the next Committee of the Whole meeting to align the Town's bylaws with the City of Hamilton's By-law Number 15-091 which regulates the installation of equipment on roads; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Council direct staff to develop appropriate standards to require Canada Post to apply for permits with an appropriate fee that reflects the resources required and costs incurred by the Town to install and maintain community mailboxes in established neighbourhoods; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT staff bring back a new by-law for Council's enactment.

Your correspondence and copy of the Town of Newmarket's Information Report titled "Canada Post Switchover to Community Mailboxes" was recently brought to my attention. We very much appreciate receiving the views of your Council and City Staff on behalf of the residents of Newmarket.

As you know, Canada Post's five-year initiative is a complex but necessary action that we are taking to transform our business in order to address the ongoing decline of Lettermail volumes in a manner that respects our statutory mandate. Last year, we began to transition the first of the one third of Canadian households that still receive their mail at the door to community mailbox delivery. To date, roughly one million households across the country have either been converted or are in the process of being converted. In so doing, Canada Post's intent is to consult and collaborate with municipalities and their staff during the conversion process. We reiterate our commitment in this regard for all impacted communities, including Newmarket.

We first advised the Mayor and Council of our intention to convert roughly 9,000 households to community mailbox delivery in November, 2014. When we began the conversion in Newmarket, we sent information packages with detailed surveys to all affected residents by which they could express their priorities and preferences. We had significant response to both the online and mail-in surveys which gave residents the opportunity to tell us which issues matter most to them. Surveys were mailed to all 9,000 homes, with 94% of respondents preferring smaller groups of boxes close to their home as opposed to groupings clustered away from their neighbourhood. We analyzed the information and shared the feedback with the Mayor, Councillors, city staff and residents in December.

In January we provided city staff with our draft siting plan so we could address any issues that might be identified by them with potential locations, particularly with respect to possible conflicts that sites may encounter with other infrastructure. We have continued our consultative process with customers and have knocked on the doors of approximately 315 addresses of residents who live adjacent to proposed locations. City staff were notified of all consequential site location moves. Andrew Walasek of our Municipal Engagement team has also been engaged regularly and directly with some of your Councillors, and this dialogue has resulted in a number of adjustments, which we have also shared with staff.

We are pleased with the level of progress regarding the conversion in the Town of Newmarket. We are well on our way towards taking the next steps with the conversion, including advising residents of the specific location of their community mailbox. We will continue to review any site concerns and to relocate the boxes where appropriate. In order to ensure as smooth a transition as possible for your residents, we need to continue to move forward with conversion activities and are unable to accommodate your request for a 180-day delay.

We note that you have engaged the Newmarket Accessibility Committee for comment regarding the implementation of community mailboxes. Canada Post considers safety and accessibility as part of our siting guidelines for community mailboxes, and we have also created a comprehensive and confidential accommodations process to ensure customers with disabilities can continue to access their mail and parcels. Every person's situation is unique, and we tailor our solutions to individual circumstances on a case-by-case basis.

Customers who have concerns about their ability to access a community mailbox are invited to call 1-844-454-3009. We will then send an information package and a questionnaire to the customer to better understand his/her concerns, while respecting privacy. After receiving a customer's completed questionnaire, a member of our dedicated and specially trained delivery accommodation team contacts the customer to discuss his/her unique needs and the solutions we can offer.

Throughout the transition process, Canada Post applies its well established criteria to ensure that community mailbox sites are safe. The safety of our customers is paramount, and we take that into account as part of our siting guidelines. We look for locations away from high-traffic areas and busy intersections, and we do install the boxes using existing street lighting and sidewalks where feasible. Canada Post is also responsible for all installation and maintenance related to the community mailboxes and has been since they were introduced 30 years ago. This includes addressing instances of graffiti and litter, as well as removing snow.

CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF NEWMARKET BY-LAW NUMBER 2015-27

A BY-LAW TO CONFIRM THE PROCEEDINGS OF A MEETING OF COUNCIL – JUNE 1, 2015.

WHEREAS s. 5(1) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, S.O. 2001, c. 25 provides that the powers of a municipal corporation shall be exercised by its Council;

AND WHEREAS s. 5(3) of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25 provides that a municipal power, including a municipality's capacity, rights, powers and privileges, shall be exercised by by-law unless the municipality is specifically authorized to do otherwise;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Town of Newmarket deems it advisable to pass such a by-law;

THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED by the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket as follows:

- THAT subject to Section 3 of this by-law, every decision of Council, as evidenced by resolution or motion, taken at the meeting at which this bylaw is passed, shall have the same force and effect as if each and every one of them had been the subject matter of a separate by-law duly enacted;
- AND THAT the execution and delivery of all such documents as are required to give effect to the decisions taken at the meeting at which this by-law is passed and the resolutions passed at that meeting are hereby authorized:
- AND THAT nothing in this by-law has the effect of giving to any decision or resolution the status of a by-law where any legal prerequisite to the enactment of a specific by-law has not been satisfied;
- 4. AND THAT any member of Council who disclosed a pecuniary interest at the meeting at which this by-law is passed shall be deemed to have disclosed that interest in this confirmatory by-law as it relates to the item in which the pecuniary interest was disclosed.

Over the past several years we have been communicating with Town staff respecting the above subject property and to date have not received any satisfaction as to curbing the problems.

Back about 1992 a makeshift structure appeared on the land, and much later we realized this was a garden centre. We residents on Lewis Drive/Gladman Ave. never received any notice of this garden centre which notice we understand is standard procedure, but when we realized it was a nursery for selling plants and trees, that was okay. Then bays started to appear and the garden centre kept enlarging with many deliveries of aggregates; trucks banging, banging tailgates when emptying which echoed right down Lewis Drive, and dirt and dust from the materials. There have been many telephone conversations and correspondence with Town staff in regard to these problems over the years with nothing being rectified.

The present owner of the garden centre (since 2013), has expanded further to include the Carmichael Landscape Design Ltd. and Carmichael Rental Bins, and is also being used as a Transfer Site for the waste from the landscaping and construction jobs.

We were advised in 2006 that Holland Valley Nursery was by Site Plan for gardening purposes and 7-8 bays, but didn't specify for what purpose the bays could be used. Then in May of 2014, we were advised not by Site Plan; it was by Permit for the sale of plants, trees, shrubs and retail sale of aggregates pertaining to gardening and landscaping.

Finally, after many years, ONE of our issues was carried out, and on July 24, 2014, a screening was erected behind the bays, which minimally decreased the dust/dirt. Then, on September 4, 2014 the poles bent from the wind and the screening folded down. As of today, no barrier has been put back up to stop the dirt/dust onto our properties.
