COMMENTS

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to provide additional information with respect to Committee of the Whole's recommendation to request that a Member of Council who requests Council's consideration of a Code of Conduct complaint pay the full cost of the investigation if after an Integrity Commissioner's review, the complaint was not upheld and alternatively, if the complaint was upheld, the councillor in question be requested to bear the cost.

Background

Pursuant to the *Municipal Act* (*Act*), should an Integrity Commissioner report to a municipality that in his or her opinion a contravention has occurred Council can then impose either a reprimand or a suspension of the remuneration paid to the Member. However recent case law indicates that in order to impose these penalties, they must first appear in the municipality's Code of Conduct by-law. Our current Code refers to sanctions including but not limited to, the demand of an apology, a public reprimand or a combination thereof. Based on the case law, it is staff's opinion that at this point in time there is no clear authority to impose a charge to an offending Councillor. However, the recommendation before Council is only requesting repayment and is strictly voluntary.

As Council is aware, the new Code of Conduct which is out for a public commenting period until the end of October, does reflect the penalties set out by the *Act* and staff will conduct further research on the option of recouping costs based on the revised Code wording. Findings will be brought back at the time the final report comes to Committee in November. A complainant's fee

(returnable if complaint upheld) could likely be imposed as a fee and charge and this will be investigated further as well.

BACKGROUND

In 2012 staff reported to Council on a proposed protocol for requests for municipal support for rooftop solar projects up to 500 kilowatts that would see all future applications of this nature approved through a "blanket" approval. After considering staff's report, Council's decision was to require that all requests for a Feed-in Tariff (FIT) resolution be considered on a site by site basis.

In following this protocol, Council on January 14, 2013 adopted Planning Report 2013-04 providing SunEdison with a support resolution under the provisions of FIT 2.0 for a rooftop solar panel installation at 800 Mulock Drive (Magna Centre). Due to changes in the program and the required forms, the applicant is requesting a new resolution under the FIT 3.0 rules. Specifically, the current request is for municipal support for a solar panel installation comprised of 475 panels on the rooftop of 800 Mulock Drive. The

applicant has advised the panels should not be visible from the street or adjacent properties. Therefore, the installation will have very little visual impact.

As Council is aware, applications are prioritized based on a point system with points being awarded for municipal council support. It is staff's understanding that in situations such as this where the installation is proposed on a municipal building, the application will in effect be "penalized" under the FIT program's point system in instances where the municipality has not provided a blanket approval for rooftop solar projects up to 500kW. The rationale for this approach appears to be a concern that if a municipality does not have a blanket approval protocol, the municipality can raise its profile in the FIT program by supporting applications on its own buildings while not supporting private applications.

Specifically, Section 5.1(f) of the FIT 3.0 Rules stipulates the following:

"Priority Points awarded by Non-Project Type may be combined with Priority Points awarded by Project Type and/or other Non-Project Type categories, provided that for an Application that receives Priority Points as a Municipal or Public Sector Entity Participation Project, such Application shall be ineligible to receive Priority Points for a Municipal Council Support Resolution of any Municipality that has an Economic Interest in the Applicant unless such Municipal Council Support Resolution is in the form of a blanket resolution that generally supports Projects utilizing a specific Renewable Fuel."

Therefore, in order to ensure the application at 800 Mulock Drive receives as many points as possible, it is recommended that Council provide a blanket support and approve this and any future applications for rooftop solar projects up to 500 kW, subject to other municipal requirements, in accordance with the FIT Program. As noted earlier in this report, this recommendation to provide a blanket approval reflects staff's original recommendation from 2012 when the FIT program was originally introduced.

The request supports the Community Strategic Plan for Living Well by providing support for an initiative that increases environmental awareness through innovative solutions for energy creation.

Building permit fees will be received by the Town for review of the building permit application. The applicant has paid the fee previously established by Council to cover the costs for staff time for reviewing and considering the resolution. In addition, the Town will receive an annual lease payment of \$11,107.85 under the FIT 3.0 program once the panels are installed.

AND WHEREAS Council enacted By-law 2004-94, being a By-law to Prohibit and Regulate Unusual Noises or Noises Likely to Disturb the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket, on July 19, 2004;

AND WHEREAS Council amended Schedule "A" to By-law 2004-94 with the enactment of By-law 2005-158 on November 28, 2005;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Town of Newmarket deems it advisable to provide an exemption to By-law 2004-94, as amended, to facilitate the necessary work for the vivaNext D1 project.

THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket as follows:

THAT Kiewit-ElllisDon, A Partnership (KED), be exempted from the Noise By-law 2004-94, as amended, from 10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. between December 27, 2013 and December 23, 2014, excluding statutory holidays, to perform necessary work for the viva*Next* D1 project.

THAT By-law Number 2010-40 be and the same is hereby further amended by:

1. Deleting from 2010-40 Schedule "A", Map No.19, the Transition (TR) Zone on Part of Lot 29, Concession 11, EYS and substituting therefore on Schedule 'A' Map No. 19 the

Residential Detached Dwelling 15m (R1-D-120) Exception Zone; Residential Detached Dwelling 12.0 m (R1-E-120) Exception Zone Residential Detached Dwelling 9.7 m (R1-F-120) Exception Zone Open Space (OS-1) Zone; and, Environmental Protection (OS-EP) Zone

as shown more particularly on Schedule "X" attached hereto, and forming part of this Bylaw.

- (a) The minimum distance between a driveway and the intersection of 2 or more streets measured along the street line, intersected by such driveway shall be 6.0 metres.
- (b) Permitted Encroachments:

An unenclosed porch, covered or uncovered, and with or without a foundation or basement area, steps and/or handicapped ramps(s) shall be permitted to encroach 3.0 metres into the required front yard and 1.5 metres into the required exterior side yard and shall be permitted to have a maximum permitted height of 4.5 metres measured from the established grade to the underside of the rafters or ceiling of the porch, however, in no case shall the porch or steps be closer than 1.5 metres from the front lot line.

Bay or box windows with or without a floor or foundation shall be permitted to encroach up to 1.0 metres into the required front yard, rear yard or exterior side yard for a maximum width of 4.0 metres. In addition, a bay or box window projection into the required rear yard may include a door.


Sills, belt courses, cornices, gutters, chimneys, pilasters, eaves, parapets or canopies shall be permitted to encroach 0.5 metres into any required yard.

- (c) No part of any main building shall be constructed in the exterior side yard or rear yard a distance of less than 2.0 m from the lot line of the flanking street, except where Leslie Street is the flanking street the minimum building setback shall be 8.0 metres. Further where any driveway and/or garage faces the exterior side yard the minimum driveway length provisions shall apply from the flanking street.
- (d) On a corner lot where a daylighting triangle or rounding has been conveyed to the public authority, the exterior side lot line and the front lot line shall be deemed to be the continued projection of the exterior side lot line and the front lot line to a point of intersection, for the purposes of calculating the required minimum front yard, minimum exterior side yard and/or minimum lot depth requirements.
- AND THAT all other provisions of By-Law 2010-40, as amended, shall apply to the lands subject to this By-Law;

BY-LAW NUMBER 2013-51

A BY-LAW TO DESIGNATE THE LOWER MAIN STREET SOUTH HERITAGE CONSERVATION DISTRICT UNDER SECTION 41 OF THE ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT.

WHEREAS pursuant to subsection 41(1) of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter o.18, the Council of a municipality may by by-law designate the municipality of any defined area thereof as a heritage conservation district;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to subsection 41.1(1) of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter O.18, a municipality shall adopt a heritage conservation district plan for each district that is designated in the by-law;

AND WHEREAS the Official Plan for the Town of Newmarket contains policies relating to the establishment of heritage conservation districts;

AND WHEREAS it is intended to designate the area defined by the by-law as a heritage conservation district;

AND WHEREAS it is intended to adopt a heritage conservation district plan for this heritage conservation district;


AND WHEREAS a public meeting with respect to the Lower Main Street South Heritage Conservation District Plan was held on December 13, 2010 with the appropriate notice of the public meeting given in accordance with the *Act*;

THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket as follows:

- 1. THAT the area outlined on Schedule "A" attached hereto and forming part of this by-law is hereby designated as a Heritage Conservation District;
- 2. AND THAT the plan shown in Schedule "B" attached hereto and forming part of this by-law is hereby adopted as a Heritage Conservation District Plan;
- AND THAT this by-law shall come into force in accordance with section 41 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, either on the day following the last day of the prescribed appeal period or as otherwise provided by subsection 41(10) of the Act.

BY-LAW NUMBER 2013-52

A BY-LAW TO CONFIRM THE PROCEEDINGS OF A MEETING OF COUNCIL - OCTOBER 21, 2013.

WHEREAS s. 5(1) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, S.O. 2001, c. 25 provides that the powers of a municipal corporation shall be exercised by its Council;

AND WHEREAS s. 5(3) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, S.O. 2001, c. 25 provides that a municipal power, including a municipality's capacity, rights, powers and privileges, shall be exercised by by-law unless the municipality is specifically authorized to do otherwise;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Town of Newmarket deems it advisable to pass such a by-law;

THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED by the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Newmarket as follows:

- 1. THAT subject to Section 3 of this by-law, every decision of Council, as evidenced by resolution or motion, taken at the meeting at which this by-law is passed, shall have the same force and effect as if each and every one of them had been the subject matter of a separate by-law duly enacted;
- AND THAT the execution and delivery of all such documents as are required to give effect to the decisions taken at the meeting at which this by-law is passed and the resolutions passed at that meeting are hereby authorized;
- AND THAT nothing in this by-law has the effect of giving to any decision or resolution the status of a by-law where any legal prerequisite to the enactment of a specific by-law has not been satisfied;
- 4. AND THAT any member of Council who disclosed a pecuniary interest at the meeting at which this by-law is passed shall be deemed to have disclosed that interest in this confirmatory by-law as it relates to the item in which the pecuniary interest was disclosed.
