“The greener the better!”

Support for diversity of gardens, including biodiversity

- 51% of survey respondents listed community garden as first or second choice. Partnerships and logistics were discussed.
- Many were in support of diverse gardens, medicine garden (or other Indigenous elements on site), peonies, etc.

“Given the current situation we are all in re. climate change and biodiversity loss, I think that we could ... increase tree canopy and plant as many native species as possible....”

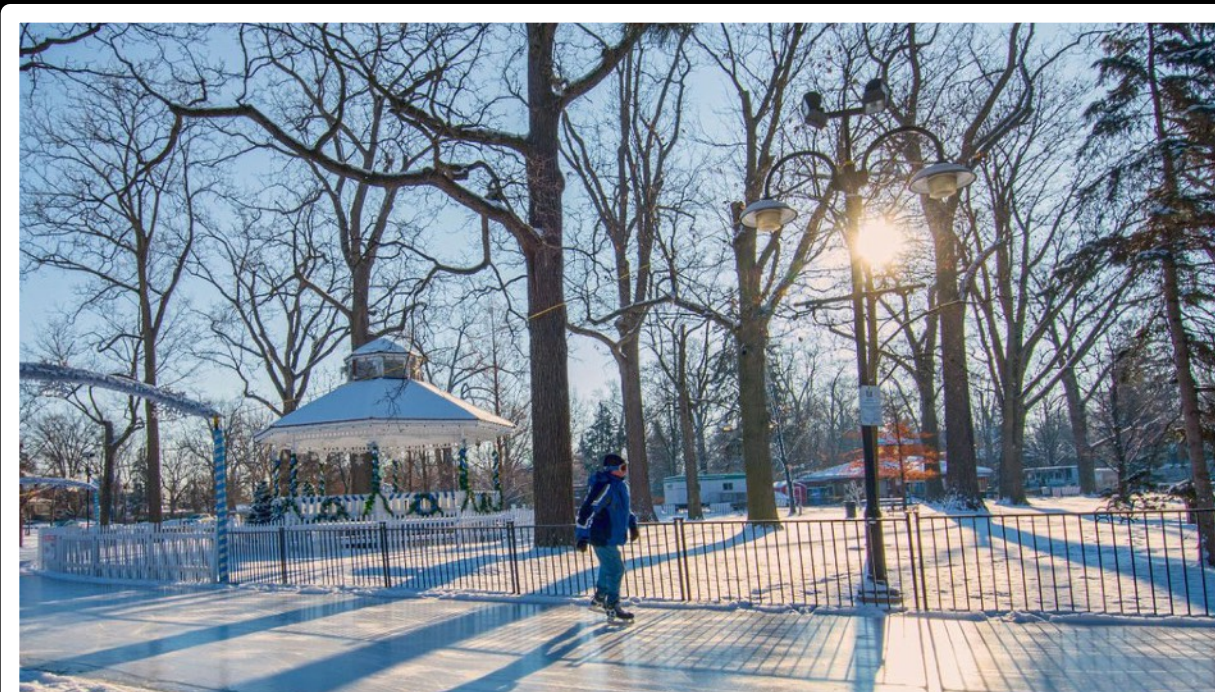
Landscape buffer

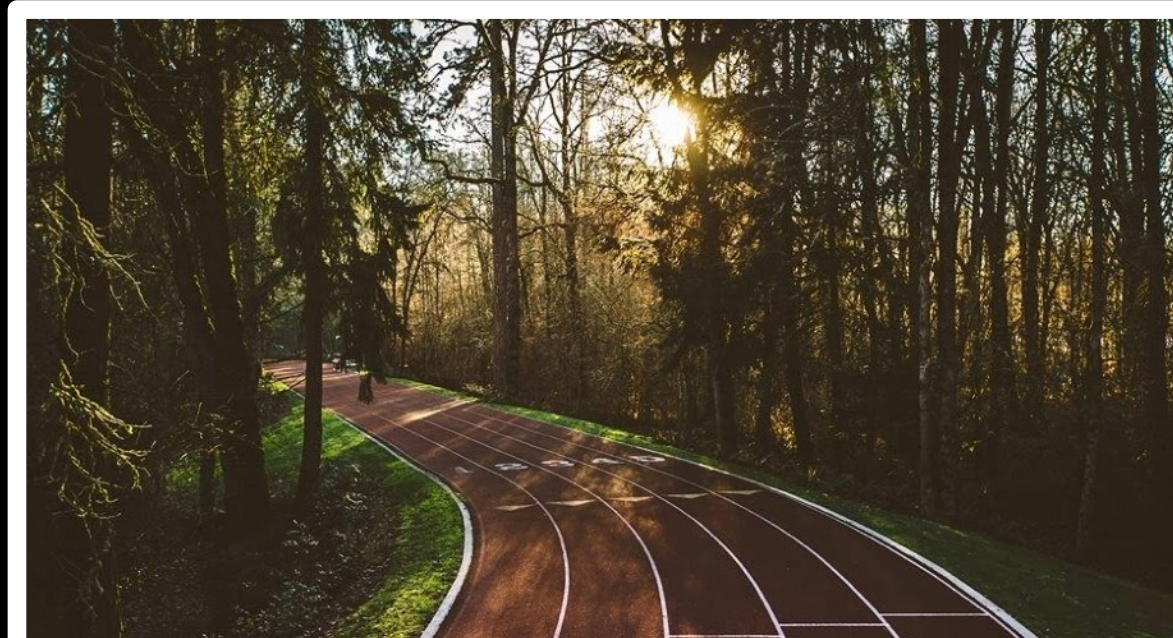

Skating, Trails and Four Season Activation

- 66% of online survey respondents prefer “a skating and walking trail through the woods” that is all season. 18% prefer only a walking trail.
- Many were supportive of the running track (over 400m).
- Requests for other four season activities.

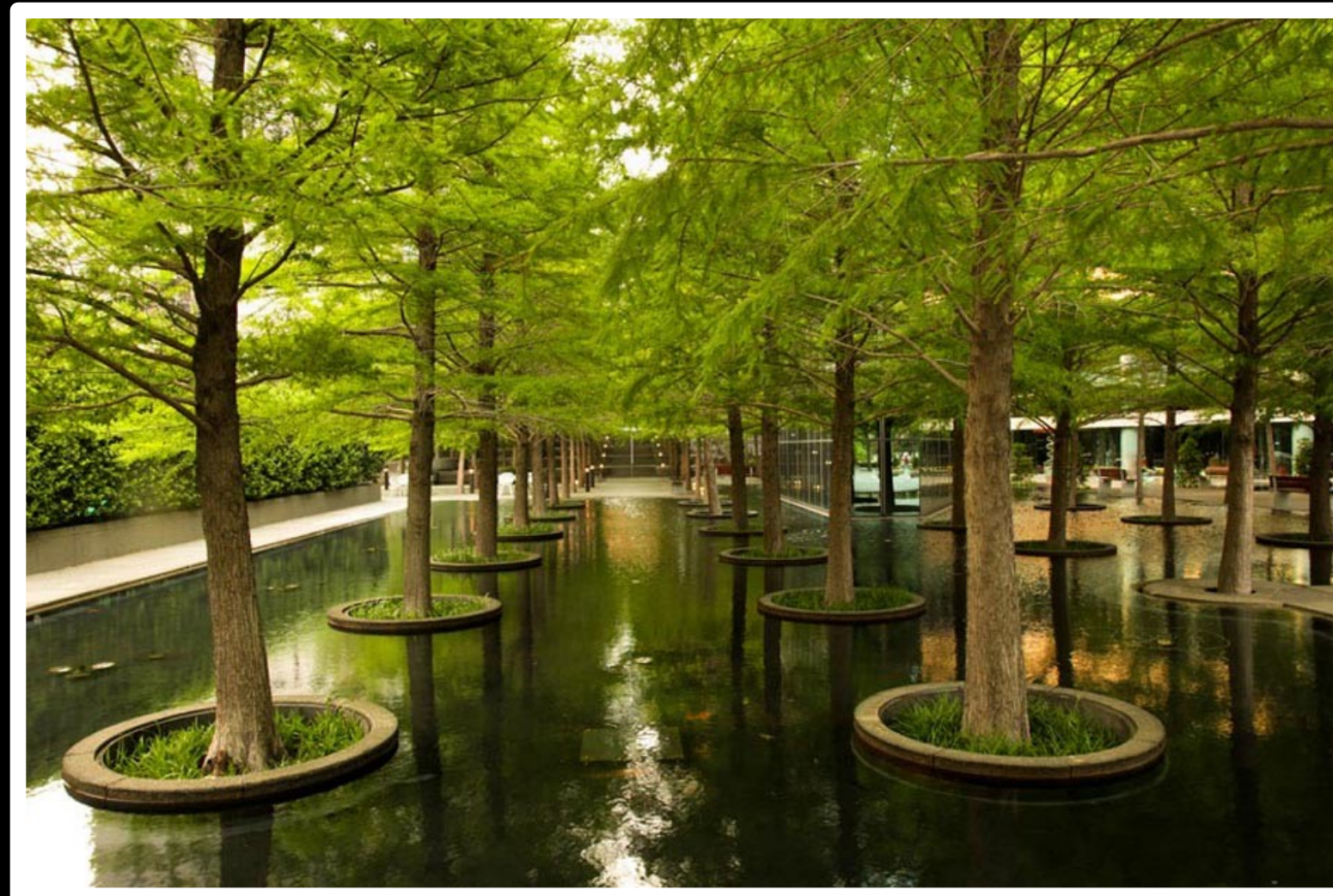
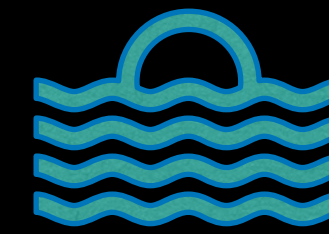
- Support for Natural Play.

“The skate trail is very appealing to the youth I have spoken with about these plans.”

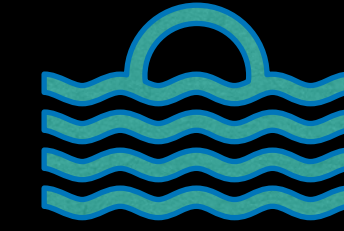
“I like the feel of skating through the woods and think it would be a draw for the community. In the summer it becomes an accessible walking trail.”

Interactive and Passive Water Feature

- Preference for peaceful and natural features
- Divergent opinions on interactive feature: 60% of online votes (18) prefer an interactive water feature. 33% (10) prefer non-interactive.
- Only a few said 'no water feature.'

"I love the idea of the water moving and making sound."

"Can use biomimicry...aim to use natural ways to filter; maybe encourage it as it's own ecosystem with trees/plants etc."

"Water is lovely for families in hot summer."

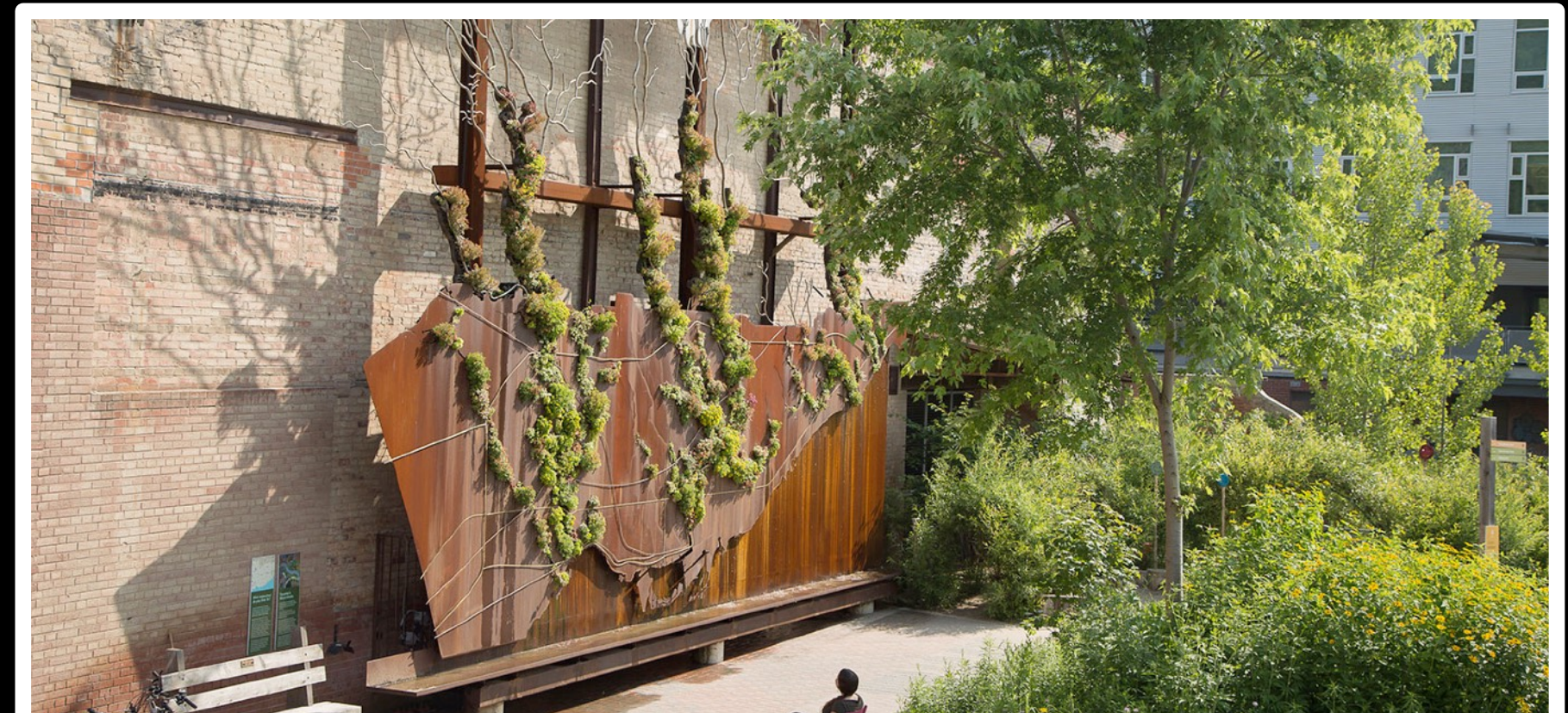

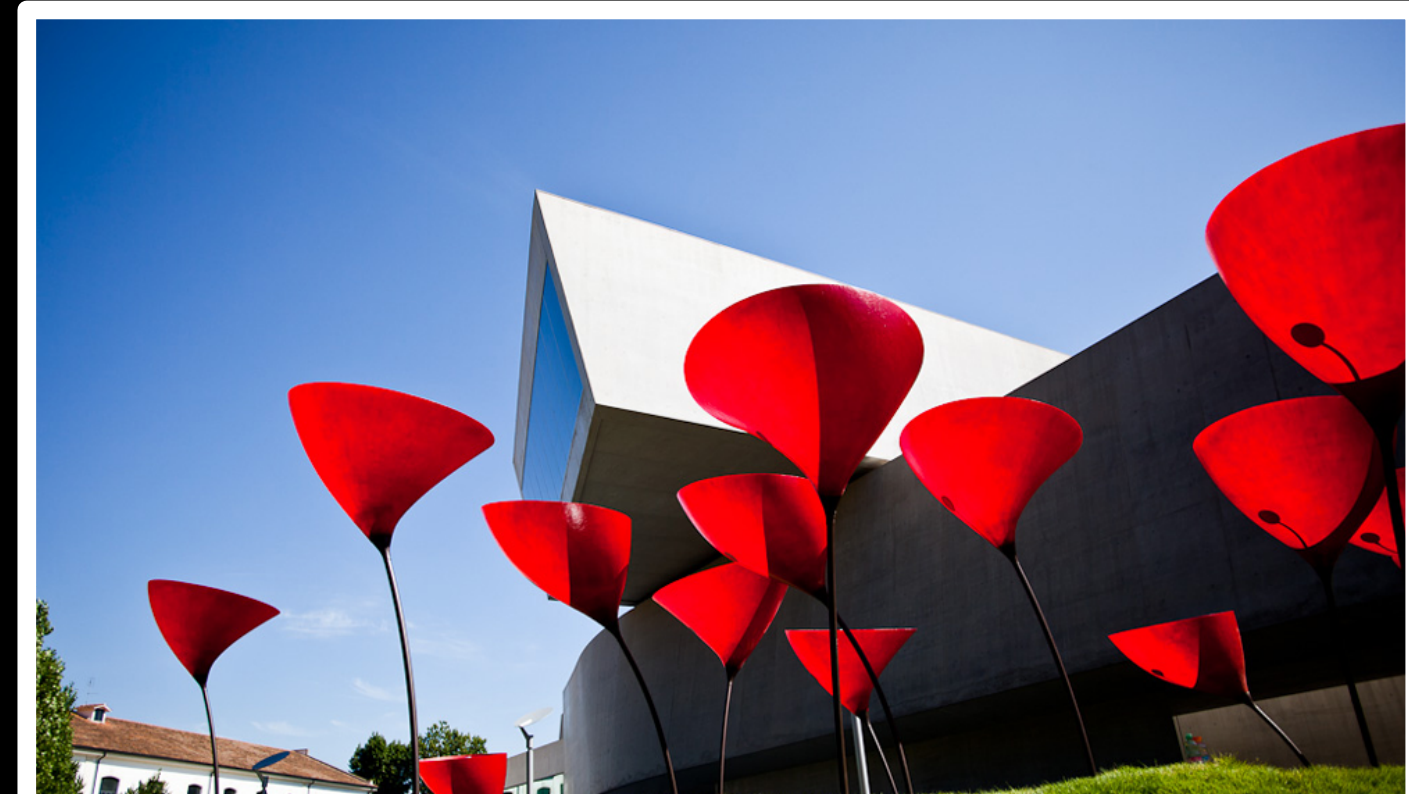

Iconic and Participatory Art

- Participants prefer art at the entrance as a 'gateway' (corner of Yonge and Mulock)
- Few comments prefer no iconic art (keep it natural or fear of vandals)
- Some support of artist residency
- Most support a mix of iconic art and temporary, participatory art, including performances and programs and that can be integrated with other elements (water, food, etc.). Much support for performances on the lawn

Anywhere and everywhere that is possible

I don't think there is a need for this. I love art, but is it necessary in a park?

"This end of town could use a central performance venue for summer concerts and community events."

"I believe art that engages people socially is the most important element for a community."

- Excitement about the house and conservatory
- 60% of online survey (15 respondents) prefer transforming the garage as a conservatory

Cafe and Beer Garden

- Support for cafe but divergent perspectives on beer garden

Fire Pit

- Support but questions about safety and maintenance logistics

“Fire pits create community, family, recreation, energy and peace. Beer gardens create problems.”

“I'm most excited about the conservatory! An indoor green space that can be used year-round sounds wonderful!”

“There wasn't any talk of the restoration of the house, but something I am passionate about and would welcome the opportunity to participate, when the time comes.”
